

# TAKE-HOME EXAMS

## academic integrity considerations

Any remote test-taking experience has the potential for students to consult course resources. Consider permitting take-home exams to minimize the temptation to cheat.

### setting expectations

- We strongly recommend you allow notes and resources for take-home exams.
- Set clear expectations and guidelines for how information from outside sources should be cited in the finished product.
- Have an explicit policy on whether collaboration with others is permitted or not. Give examples of both appropriate and inappropriate communication about the exam among classmates.
- State whether resources like the Writing Center or EPASS tutoring are permitted.
- If not open book / open resource, be clear to students and give a time limit for completion of the exam that is appropriate for the exam.

### advantages for this method

- Allows students to complete the exam at a time that is convenient for them.
- Gives students the ability with their household for a “quiet time” to take the exam.
- Creates flexibility for students who may have other exams around the same time.
- Does not require live proctoring.
- If using notes and resources is permitted, students are on an even playing field.

### disadvantages for this method

- Take-home exams often include essay and free response questions, so automated grading is not possible.
- Risk of conversation or collaboration on the exam among students (if this not permitted).
